IN THE BEGINNING...

Once upon a time...is how every good story starts. The beginning of a good story is filled with excitement and anticipation. The beginning of a story is important because it sets the scene and gets readers excited for what is to come. Who are the main characters going to be? What adventure are they going to go on? What challenges are they going to face? Will the good guys win in the end? At the beginning of the story, we're not quite sure how it's going to end, but we start the story to find out! There's no point starting a story at the end – you wouldn't know who's who, what's going on, or why everything has happened the way it has. You have to start, in the beginning...

This year at Gateway Kids we are taking a journey through the Bible. We are going to learn that the Bible isn't a made-up story; it is a collection of true stories about God's great love and plan for His people, that all point to Jesus!

To start it off, we'll go back to the very beginning of God's story: Genesis and Exodus. These two books of the Bible set the scene for the rest of God's big story! We're going to discover that God created the world and ever since the beginning, God has had a plan to be with us forever. Because God created the whole world (He is big, powerful, creative and mighty), we can trust His plan and follow Jesus.

Are you ready for a great story?

In the beginning...

Devotion Guide

READ: Kick off each family devotion by reading a pertinent Bible passage aloud, encouraging engagement through acting out or watching suggested videos. Emphasize the use of a physical Bible to foster hands-on navigation and reading discipline.

SHARE: Facilitate meaningful discussions with four weekly questions, consistently delving into key concepts and offering practical applications for daily life.

Do: Participate in family activities or challenges provided in each devotion, some designed for immediate involvement and others for reflection throughout the week. Prioritize checking for necessary resources beforehand, typically regular household items.

PRAY: Conclude your family devotion with a collective prayer, underscoring the potency of praying together and the significance of simple, sincere prayers. Reinforce that praying audibly with kids is a powerful example for them.

REMEMBER: Encourage Bible memorization with a weekly "know it verse," turning it into a delightful family competition or incorporating spontaneous challenges throughout the week. Utilize various methods like the Gateway Kids Truth Card or posting the verse in common areas.

GO DEEPER: Establish a daily family routine of Bible reading by exploring additional passages focusing on Jesus' life and ministry. This intentional practice aims to deepen the family's understanding and connection with God's Word.

MY STORY SNAPSHOT: Record a succinct weekly story summary for quick reference, turning this into a playful activity by challenging family members to recall facts quickly, fostering an enjoyable learning experience.

Introduction: What is the Bible?

When you go to the library to choose a book, what sort of book do you look for? What book will you choose? Do you go straight to the section with picture books and find a book with bright colours and eye-catching images? Or do you prefer a book with lots of words to read? Do you like to read books in a series so you can follow along with your favourite characters for longer, or do you like new characters and settings with every story?

Before you can discover the adventures held within the pages of a storybook, you first have to pick it up and open it. It's the same with the Bible. Before we start 'in the beginning' of God's great story, let's have a look at the Bible itself.

READ

Instead of reading a bible passage today, familiarise yourself with the Bible as a whole book. Show your children a few different types of Bibles (e.g. Adult full bible, children's picture bible etc.) Encourage your kids to hold the Bible, open it up and look inside. Point out the different sections, books and verses.

SHARE

- 1. What's your favourite Bible story? Do you know where to find it?
- 2. What's the first story you remember hearing/reading in the Bible?
- 3. Why is God's Bible so important?
- 4. When/where do you like to read your Bible?

DO

Older children: Bible Challenge – race each other to find specific verses or stories in the Bible (e.g. John 3:16, Jonah, Psalm 23 etc.).

Younger children: Bible Challenge – using a picture Bible, name a character (e.g. Jesus, Jonah, Moses) or item (e.g. fish, cross, boat) and see how long it takes the kids to find it in the Bible

Spend some time thanking God for His Word (the Bible). Ask him to help you see/hear/understand the words and stories you read. You might also like to pray for people who translate the Bible into different languages so people from other countries can read God's Word too.

REMEMBER

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

Week 2 In the beginning God...

The Bible is full of stories, but these weren't made up. They are true! And they tell us of a time long ago. The very first story tells us how the world began. And it all began with God.

In the beginning God created the world.

Read today's story and discover the most important character in the whole Bible – our magnificent Creator, God.

READ

Passage: Genesis 1:1-2:3

Read the passage aloud in full or break it up into smaller sections. Then, use the 'Story Snapshot' to highlight and recall the main parts of the story.



Video option: <u>Creation (Genesis 1-2) by Saddleback Kids</u> (scan QR code to watch)

SHARE

- 1. What stands out to you in this passage?
- What is your favourite part of God's creation and why?
- 3. If you could create a world, what would you put in it?
- 4. What are you thankful for that God created? (e.g. light, puppies, family)

DO

Option 1: Make your own creation – use play dough or craft items to recreate the story. Make the stars, trees, fish, birds, animals and people!

Option 2: Alphabet game – name one thing God created for every letter of the alphabet. You could make it extra challenging by playing this game while you're walking/driving somewhere. Can you spy something God made that starts with A-Z?

Spend some time praying and thanking God for all the wonderful things he created – including you, your family and friends!

REMEMBER

In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. Genesis 1:1

Week 3 God's Plan

Once upon a time there was a boy who was terrible at following instructions. If you said to turn left, he'd jump up. If you said write a story about an animal, he'd write a story about his water bottle. If you said to build a bridge out of paddle pop sticks, he'd build a helicopter, out of marshmallows, then eat it. For some people, it's hard to follow instructions. Even instructions that keep us safe. When God created people, he gave them special instructions for how to live. But people weren't very good at listening to God and following Him. The perfect world God made wasn't so perfect anymore but...

...in the beginning God had a plan.

Read today's story to hear about God's plan to save people.

READ

Passage: Genesis 6:5-22

Read the passage aloud in full or break it up into smaller sections. Then, use the 'Story Snapshot' to highlight and recall the main parts of the story.

SHARE

- 1. What stands out to you in this passage?
- Do you think it was easy or hard for Noah to trust God's plan? Why?
- 3. What might it have felt like to be the only person who followed God?
- 4. Where do you see wickedness and sin on earth today?

DO

Option 1: Origami Boats – search for instructions on Google then learn how to fold an origami boat out of A4 paper.

Option 2: Will it float? – Collect some random items from your home and test to see if they will float in a container full of water.

Thank God for his faithfulness and forgiveness. We still sin but God promised never to flood the whole world again. Pray for people who have not chosen to follow God's way, yet. Pray that they would turn to God for forgiveness.

It's a good thing God created everything and everyone different! You are special and unique! Look around you – there are differences everywhere. Different colours, different sounds, different tastes, and different people! Because...

...in the beginning God created diversity.

Read today's story to hear about how much God valued diversity – different cultures, languages and life-stories.

READ

Passage: Genesis 11:1-9

Read the passage aloud in full or break it up into smaller sections. Then, use the 'Story Snapshot' to highlight and recall the main parts of the story.



Video option: <u>God's Story: Tower of Babel by Crossroad's Kids</u> <u>club</u> (scan QR code to watch)

SHARE

- 1. What stands out to you in this passage?
- 2. Can you say anything in a different language?
- 3. Name someone you know who lives in or comes from a different country.
- 4. Name one thing that makes you unique.

DO

Option 1: God Loves You – learn how to say "God loves you" in a different language. You might have to use the internet to do this or ask a friend who speaks a different language to English.

Option 2: The World – Use a globe or map to find different places in the world. Can you find your city? How about where your friends come from/live?

Spend some time thanking God for creating diversity. Pray for people from other places who haven't heard about God yet. Pray for missionaries who travel to different countries to share the love of God.

Today's story is about a promise that God made though. It wasn't a small promise, nor was it a promise that seemed possible. But with God, anything can happen.

In the beginning God makes big promises.

Read today's story to hear about God's big promise to a man named Abram.

READ

Passage: Genesis 12:1-7 + Genesis 15:4-5

Read the passage aloud in full or break it up into smaller sections. Then, use the 'Story Snapshot' to highlight and recall the main parts of the story.

Video option: <u>God's Promise for Abraham by Saddleback Kids</u> (scan QR code to watch)

SHARE

- 1. What stands out to you in this passage?
- 2. Has someone ever made you a promise? If so, what was it?
- 3. What promises has God given you/us? (e.g. rainbow/no flood, eternal life, his presence, etc.)
- 4. Have you ever moved house (or country)? Talk about what it is/might be like.

DO

Option 1: Star gazing – Pick a clear night and spend some time looking at the stars. How many can you count? Can you identify any constellations?

Option 2: Go... – Blindfold one person in the group then lead them to a different place in the house. See if they can guess where they are before you take the blind fold off.

Thank God for his promises to always be with us, to always love us and to welcome us into his home forever.

Week 6A promise fulfilled

Josiah kept his promise in this made-up story however in real life, the promises we make are often hard to keep. But that's not the same with God

In the beginning God keeps his promises.

Read today's story to hear how God fulfilled his big promise to Abraham.

READ

Passage: Genesis 18:1-10 + Genesis 21:1-7

Read the passage aloud in full or break it up into smaller sections. Then, use the 'Story Snapshot' to highlight and recall the main parts of the story.

SHARE

- 1. What stands out to you in this passage?
- 2. Who is the oldest person you know? How old are they?
- 3. How does it feel when someone keeps a promise they made to you?
- 4. When it seems like God is not doing anything, what can you do to keep trusting his promises? (e.g. quote a bible verse, remember what God has done before)

DO

Option 1: Baby Snapshots – Have some fun looking back through baby photos for each person in your family. Do you look similar as babies?

Option 2: How Old? – Have a look around your house. What is the oldest

item in your home? How old is it and where did it come from?

PRAY

Thank God for keeping his promises. Pray that God would help you be patient as you keep trusting God even when it feels like God's not doing anything.

Imperfect people

Once upon a time, Jarod was incredibly mean—kicking bins, hurling insults, cheating at Mario Kart, and lying. Nobody liked him, except for Nathaniel, who, despite Jarod's antics, invited him to his birthday party because Nathaniel believed in God's love for imperfect Jarod. Despite the challenge, Nathaniel saw beyond Jarod's flaws, understanding that if God cared about mean, imperfect Jarod, he should too. None of us are perfect, but...

...in the beginning God uses imperfect people.

Read today's story to hear about two brothers who didn't always get along but were still a part of God's big story.

READ

Passage: Genesis 27:1-35

Read the passage aloud in full or break it up into smaller sections. Then, use the 'Story Snapshot' to highlight and recall the main parts of the story.

Video option: <u>Jacob and Esau by Saddleback Kids</u> (scan QR code to watch)



SHARE

- 1. What stands out to you in this passage?
- 2. Have you ever lost a friend because they did something to hurt you? Share about it.
- 3. Can you think of anything that is more valuable because it is imperfect?
- 4. Do you think God should use 'imperfect people' in His plans? Why/why not?

DO

Option 1: Guess Who? – Blind fold one person, spin them around then have someone else from the family quietly stand in front of them. Can the blindfolded person guess who it is just by feeling their hands/face/hair?

Option 2: Nature Hunt – Find a time to go on a nature walk to find 'imperfect but beautiful' things. E.g. splotched leaves, broken shells, rough bark etc. Marvel at the beauty of imperfect things.

None of us are perfect, but God still loves us. Thank him for always forgiving you. Ask that He will help you forgive people who have hurt you.

REMEMBER

God showed his great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners.

RFAD

Passage: Genesis 37:1-28 + Genesis 50:15-21

Read the passage aloud in full or break it up into smaller sections. Then, use the 'Story Snapshot' to highlight and recall the main parts of the story.



Video option: <u>God's Story: Joseph by Crossroads Kids Club</u> (scan QR code to watch)

SHARE

- 1. What stands out to you in this passage?
- 2. What are your hopes and dreams for your future?
- 3. Has anything ever happened that changed or interrupted your plans? Share about it.
- 4. Share stories of how God has brought good from situations that seem bad.

DO

Option 1: Broken Pieces – Tear up a sheet of paper into small pieces (coloured/plain/newspaper). Use these torn pieces to create a beautiful mosaic/collage (if you're allowed, you could even carefully smash an old plate/pot and use those broken pieces to create something beautiful.)

Option 2: Pizza Night – Plan a night to make your own pizza (or other savoury item). As you're preparing the food, take note of how the ingredients on their own are not very nice, but once they're mixed and cooked, they turn into something delicious!

Spend some time thanking God for the many times he has brought something good during really hard times – family, friends, new skills, strength and more!

READ

Passage: Exodus 2:1-10

Read the passage aloud in full or break it up into smaller sections. Then, use the 'Story Snapshot' to highlight and recall the main parts of the story.

Video option: <u>Baby Moses by Saddleback Kids</u> (scan QR code to watch)



SHARE

- 1. What stands out to you in this passage?
- 2. What important jobs have you done (at home/at school etc.)?
- 3. How old do you have to be before you can do something good for God?
- 4. Do you know any children who are serving God somewhere? Share about them.

DO

Option 1: Acts of Kindness – Brainstorm some acts of kindness that you can do as a family (or as kids) for others. Then, set a time to do them! (e.g. weed a neighbour's garden, make a meal for another family).

Option 2: Young Guides – Blindfold someone older in the family then have someone younger guide them from one point to another.

Pray that God would show you more opportunities to serve in His Kingdom. Pray for courage to do it!

REMEMBER

Don't let anyone think less of you because you are young. Be an example to all believers in what you say, in the way you live, in your love, your faith, and your purity.

Freedom

READ

Read the passage aloud in full or break it up into smaller sections. Then, use the 'Story Snapshot' to highlight and recall the main parts of the story.



Video option: <u>Moses and the Exodus by Saddleback Kids</u> (scan QR code to watch)

SHARE

- 1. What stands out to you in this passage?
- 2. What did God's people need to be set free from?
- 3. What stops us from enjoying everything God has planned for us?
- 4 How did Jesus set us free?

DO

Option 1: Number Games – Play a game that uses numbers (Uno, snap, memory with cards) or for younger children, get them to collect ten different items like the ten different plagues.

Option 2: No, No, No, Go! – Place an item in the middle of the table that everyone can reach and easily hold. Nominate someone to be 'Pharaoh'. Their job is to say no, no, no (as many times as they want) then 'go'. The first 22

person to grab the item gets to be Pharaoh for the next round.

PRAY

Thank God in prayer for the freedom he gives through Jesus – pray for people who are still trapped in their own choices. Pray that they would want Jesus to set them free too!

REMEMBER

Christ has set us free to enjoy our freedom. So remain strong in the faith... Galatians 5:1
